Fluency and Expression

Use punctuation clues to guide expression	Use a loud or soft voice
Look for important words to emphasise	Speak like the character
Read with rhythm	Change the tone
Read with eyes then with mouth	

Some hints to assist students with frequent word errors

Long and short vowels	Does it have an 'e' on the end?
E.g. cake, Tim, Time, bake, tube, rope, fuse, cod,	Will the vowel be short or long?
cub, hop, hope, explode, impose, consume	Read the word
If there is an 'e' on the end the vowel will be	
long ('a', 'e', 'l', 'o', 'u')	
Vowel Suffixes -'ed', 'ing', 'er', 'est'	Does it have a double consonant?
E.g. Double the consonant (short vowel)	Will the vowel be short or long?
hopping, stunned, snuggest	
E.g. Drop the 'e' add the vowel suffix (long	
vowel)	
traded, liking, tuner, hoping	
Prefixes	Read the prefix
un, mis, un, pre, re	Read the base word

Suffixes	Read the base word
ed, ing, er, est	Read the suffix
